
From the Pastor

Reflection on **Summer Mission**

A week ago we said goodbye to the summer mission (SM) group from Ohio. Their time here came and went so quickly. However, I think this group was the more aligned with our vision of reaching students for Christ here in Slovenia than past groups have been. In addition to building relationships, the SM spent everyday having spiritual conversations on campus. On Wednesday's they had a dinner event focused on building relationships with the Slovene students and Thursday nights was a weekly meeting where they could bring their students for a time of worship, community, and time in the Word. The SM was diligent in following up with students they met and this summer 3 Slovenians became Christians.

Here is what a couple of the SM students had to say about their time in Slovenia: "I've never been surrounded by this many people who are so dedicated to finding out how the Lord wants to work in their life! Sharing the gospel with a new person every day more than opened my eyes to how many different ways a person can find a home in Jesus, and has blown my mind to see the love that God has for us. I've seen for the first time somebody accept Christ, and in that moment it was like a light was ignited in that person. I will forever cherish the memories and lifelong friends that I have made here!" -Chris Keener

"Coming to Slovenia was never something I pictured for myself and I didn't have many expectations except that God would show up, and He definitely did. These last six weeks were more challenging than I could've imagined, in having to back up my beliefs and continually pursue people who weren't always excited to talk about the Gospel; but in those challenges and exposing my weaknesses, God was glorified and there is no doubt in my mind that He was at work in the lives of a lot of Slovene students. I am going home knowing with such certainty that I do not have the power to make people understand the weight of the Gospel, but I know with just as much certainty that I serve a God who can do that and will be bringing Slovenes to him long after I leave."-Kristen Bisig
