#### The Future?



One of my favorite stories from this summer involved meeting Eveline (black and white picture above). I met up with a few friends for dinner two days after I returned from America. Eveline, who is from Holland, was at the dinner as well. She was on vacation traveling through countries in former Yugoslavia. Right away I enjoyed her. She was so kind and great at initiating conversations.

She was so intrigued to find out that I worked with a Christian organization. I told her that many times when people think of Christianity they think of "Do's and Don'ts" and they miss what it is really about. Eveline followed up by asking me to share the main message of Christianity. Within two minutes of our spiritual conversation I was sharing the gospel with her.

Eveline was very attentive. She did not understand how God could be loving. Why would an all powerful God not just make us have a relationship with Him? I explained that none of us are deserving of it. And yet, through Jesus, God made a way for people to have a relationship with Him if they choose to accept it. She responded by saying, "I guess I had never thought of it like that before. You are right, that is really loving."

She continued to ask questions like "How did you come to believe this was true?", "How can I know what God wants for my life?", and "How can I know who God is?" I spent the remainder of my time sharing my testimony and helping her understand the significance of the Bible and why it is such an amazing gift given to us.
